FINDING THE RIGHT JOB

When searching for the right job, consider these three factors:

- 1. The **type of disability** you have. What are your strengths and functional limitations? There is no need to limit your possibilities but do consider your strengths and the potential paths in which you would most excel.
- 2. Your **qualifications and skills**. It is important to be aware of the essential functions of the position you are interested in and whether they align with your skill set.
- 3. Your **interests and passions**. What makes you happy? You should pursue a career that not only makes sense for you but is also something you enjoy and can see yourself doing long-term.

WHEN TO DISCLOSE A DISABILITY

Is there a need to disclose?

- If you require accommodation, then yes, you need to disclose a disability.
- If you do not require accommodation, it is up to you whether to disclose a disability.





When deciding whether to disclose a disability, keep in mind:

- Does the company value diversity?
- Do you require accommodation during the application process, interview, or on the job?
- Do you know your rights according to the ADA?

WHEN IS THE RIGHT TIME TO DISCLOSE?

The right time is whenever you feel most comfortable. However, the sooner the better. By disclosing your disability, you will be able to receive the resources and accommodation you may need.

HOW TO DISCLOSE

Be confident, Relaxed, Professional,

You can let your employer know:

- 1. Before the interview.
- 2. During the interview.
- 3. After the interview, before you start the job.

In any case, if you choose to disclose, you will want to let your employer know what accommodations you may need to be successful. You can also emphasize your strengths and unique capabilities following your disability.

Americans with Disabilities Act

The ADA is a civil rights law that prohibits discrimination against individuals with disabilities in all areas of public life, including jobs, schools, transportation, and all public and private places that are open to the public. The purpose of the law is to make sure that people with disabilities have the same rights and opportunities as everyone else. The ADA gives civil rights protections to individuals with disabilities like those provided to individuals based on race, color, sex, national origin, age, and religion. It guarantees equal opportunity for individuals with disabilities in public accommodations, employment, transportation, state and local government services, and telecommunications.
